
The Fourth Week of Advent

Week Commencing 19th December 2016



"God is with us"

Matthew 1:18-24

This is how the birth of Jesus the Messiah came about: His mother Mary was pledged to be married to Joseph, but before they came together, she was found to be pregnant through the Holy Spirit. Because Joseph her husband was faithful to the law, and yet did not want to expose her to public disgrace, he had in mind to divorce her quietly.

But after he had considered this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins."

All this took place to fulfil what the Lord had said through the prophet: "The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and they will call him Emmanuel" (which means "God with us").

When Joseph woke up, he did what the angel of the Lord had commanded him and took Mary home as his wife.

What we hear in the Gospel is about the family of Jesus. We see his parents: they have a problem, a big problem. Mary stands helpless, because she is conceived by the Holy Spirit, before her marriage

The Gospel calls Joseph as a faithful man. It suits him very well, because he does not make any quick decision. He acts not for his right, but has a human concern.

God comes to help Joseph in vision, "Joseph, son of David! Do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife!" Joseph heard the voice of God after which everything in his life Changed. The baby and Mary are no longer a "problem" for him.

He sees everything differently. The angel tells him that the child is God's son. Now he gets a great and important task, he must protect the baby Jesus and he is happy to do so. Our world is in a hurry. Everything must be done quickly. Everything that is slow may not fit into our world!

A slow car or a computer. Joseph reminds us, there is always a solution for every problem. We have to take time for ourselves, to think, and to sometimes ask for advice and help from God and people around us.

Joseph is a role model for many of us. He gave God an important place in his life.

Theme

Action

Reflection
