What happens to the phones:

The recycled handsets are re-used around the world. In developing countries, getting a fixed landline can be expensive: Second hand mobiles are an affordable and sustainable means of communication that help businesses to run more efficiently and families to stay in touch more easily.

Doublets is a game which was invented by Lewis Carroll, who described it in these words: 'Two words are proposed, of the same length; and the puzzle consists in linking these together by interposing other words, each of which shall differ from the next word in *one letter only*... As an example, the word 'head' may be changed into 'tail' by interposing the words 'heal, teal, tell, tall.' Thus Carroll changed 'head' into 'tail' in five moves:

The SJP Virtual Learning Environment (VLE)

We are delighted to be launching our latest teaching and learning tool this week – our very own VLE. Once again this puts SJP at the cutting edge of educational initiatives, well ahead of the Government's intention of seeing a VLE in all schools by September 2008.

Our VLE will give all our Pupils the opportunity to benefit from 'anytime and anywhere learning' by using the internet to keep up to date with their work. Increasingly SJP teachers will be using our VLE to set work for Pupils, Pupils will submit completed work to their teachers on our VLE and teachers will be able to track the progress being made by each individual student. Pupils will always be able to go back to resources used in lessons, including any presentations, so making revision so much easier.





All Pupils will be given their own usernames, passwords and an initial guide to our VLE in their ICT lessons over the next two weeks.



The first task will be a simple one to get everybody going – a snapshot survey on proposed changes to the lunchtime menu. This will be another powerful benefit of our VLE, being able to gauge student opinion quickly on a range of issues so enhancing the impact of student voice in decision making at SJP.

The key benefits anticipated over time from our VLE are:

• Pupils will develop independent learning skills and have more control over how and when they work.

- Absent Pupils can continue their learning from home, with work set by the teacher on our VLE, and marked and returned within our VLE.
- Pupils won't be able forget to bring their work in, or lose it!
- Pupils will be able to access learning materials created by their teachers, outside lesson time and from locations such as a library and home.
- Pupils will be able to store work and notes online for use in assignments, homework and revision, outside normal school hours.
- Pupils will be able to work at their own pace and with a wider choice of learning styles, through a more personalised curriculum.
- Pupils will be able to communicate by email and participate in live discussions and forums with other Pupils and teachers, in a secure environment.
- Parents can access their child's personal home page to keep track of their work, their progress and the curriculum.
- Parents can participate in their child's learning and have another way of keeping in touch with the College.

'Anywhere, anytime learning'.

SJP is an 'outstanding College where exceptional things happen'. Our VLE will underpin our Specialist School status as a Technology and Humanities College and keep us at the forefront of educational innovation, to the benefit of all of our Pupils and Parents.
