




Carnival at SJP!





I never saw another butterfly




1.5 million children perished in the Holocaust. In an effort to remember them, the Holocaust Museum in Houston, USA is collecting 1.5 million handmade butterflies.

The butterflies will eventually comprise a breath-taking exhibition, currently scheduled for Spring 2013, in memory of all these children. The Museum has already collected an estimated 400,000 butterflies for the display which is based upon the poem "I never saw another butterfly".

The SJP College community is contributing towards the exhibition by sending to the Holocaust Museum the butterflies created by our students during Holocaust Memorial Week.
