Duke of Edinburgh

Our Duke of Edinburgh's Award season kicked off last Friday and Saturday as thirty students and five staff drove out to Delamere Forest, the first group of our new cohort of Year 9 Bronze Award candidates.

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award, a prestigious and nationally recognised award, is no mean feat as students are required to navigate around a 25 km course over two days, while carrying a range of kit including: a tent, sleeping bag, stove, food and water for the duration of their time in the field. The students are accompanied by a member of our trained staff throughout the practice expedition to provide the group with essential training in the art of navigation and prevent anyone from getting lost. All students completed their training expedition with flying colours.

Qualifying expeditions are scheduled to take place in the latter half of the Summer Term and we wish all of our students improved weather and good luck with the rest of their award.

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






Derren Brown



Weekly Theme - 'Being a Witness'

John 20: 19-31 Later, Jesus showed himself to his followers again—this time at Lake Galilee. This is how he showed himself: Some of the followers were together: Simon Peter, Thomas, Nathaniel from Cana in Galilee, the two sons of Zebedee, and two other followers. Simon Peter said, "I am going out to fish." The others said, "We will go with you." So they went out and got into the boat. They fished that night but caught nothing. Early the next morning Jesus stood on the shore, but the followers did not know it was Jesus. Then he said to them, "Friends, did you catch any fish?" They answered, "No." He said, "Throw your net on the right side of the boat, and you will find some." So they did, and they caught so many fish they could not pull the net back into the boat. The follower whom Jesus loved said to Peter, "It is the Lord!" When Peter heard him say this, he wrapped his coat around himself (Peter had taken his clothes off). Then he jumped into the water. The other followers went to shore in the boat, dragging the net full of fish. They were not very far from shore, only about a hundred yards. When the followers stepped out of the boat and onto the shore, they saw a fire of hot coals. There were fish on the fire, and there was bread. Then Jesus said, "Bring some of the fish you just caught." Simon Peter went into the boat and pulled the net to the shore. It was full of big fish, 153 in all, but even though there were so many, the net did not tear. Jesus said to them, "Come and eat." None of the followers dared ask him, 'Who are you?' because they knew it was the Lord. Jesus came and took the bread and gave it to them, along with the fish. This was now the third time Jesus showed himself to his followers after he was raised from the dead. When they finished eating, Jesus said to Simon Peter, "Simon son of John, do you love me more than these?" He answered, "Yes, Lord, you

know that I love you." Jesus said, "Feed my lambs." Again Jesus said, "Simon son of John, do you love me?" He answered, "Yes, Lord, you know that I love you." Jesus said, "Take care of my sheep." A third time he said, "Simon son of John, do you love me?" Peter was hurt because Jesus asked him the third time, "Do you love me?" Peter said, "Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you!" He said to him, "Feed my sheep. I tell you the truth, when you were younger, you tied your own belt and went where you wanted. But when you are old, you will put out your hands and someone else will tie you and take you where you don't want to go." (Jesus said this to show how Peter would die to give glory to God.) Then Jesus said to Peter, "Follow me!"

It is a remarkable claim; that your friend has risen from the dead. No wonder the friends of Jesus, at first found this difficult to believe. But as soon as they did believe they were keen to tell everyone they met about it. Each of the apostles died for their keenness to tell others about the Good News of Jesus. As Christians we are faced with the same challenge today two thousand years later, to believe that Jesus rose from the dead and to bear witness to him in the way we live our lives. We will thankfully never be put to death for our belief in Jesus, but we may be laughed at or mocked by people. It takes courage to be a follower of Jesus. We have to have courage.

Father, you raised Jesus your Son To a glorious new life in you. May we have deep faith in the Resurrection and be your witnesses by the joy and quality of our lives.

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
