

John 1:29-34

John the Baptist saw Jesus coming toward him and said, "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world. He is the one of whom I said, 'A man is coming after me who ranks ahead of me because he existed before me.' I did not know him, but the reason why I came baptising with water was that he might be made known to Israel." John testified further, saying, I saw the Spirit come down like a dove from heaven and remain upon him. I did not know him, but the one who sent me to baptise with water told me, 'On whomever you see the Spirit come down and remain, he is the one who will baptise with the Holy Spirit.' Now I have seen and testified that he is the Son of God."

To provide a reference for somebody is a serious responsibility as well as a privilege because, more often than not, a good deal depends on what it says about the person for who it is written.

John the Baptist took it upon himself to be a referee for Jesus. His reference for Jesus tells us exactly who Jesus is. John tells us that Jesus is more than a prophet or teacher. John wants people to understand just who Jesus really is. He wants everyone to know that Jesus is the 'Lamb of God', the 'chosen one of God'.

He is the one on whom God's Spirit descends and remains.

In the scriptures we are told that the "Lamb of God" will take away the sins of the world. Twenty-one centuries later there is still violence and hunger and exploitation in our world taking place on a massive scale. The work of the Lamb of God is never finished God's work is never finished. Witness to that is part of the legacy Nelson Mandela has left to our world.

Today we are called to carry on the "Work of the Lamb" through our service to others.
