Revising Sentences

This week we're continuing with sentence structure. This week we're looking at what a compound sentence is.

Key terms

COMPOUND SENTENCE: one consisting of more than one main clause

CONJUNCTION: A word class consisting of words which join either words or clauses together within a sentence.

- and is a conjunction and joins the sentences.
- **but** and **or** are other conjunctions used to join what could be separate simple sentences.
- Two simple sentences being joined together in this way is known as a compound sentence.

Have a go! Make a compound sentence by adding a conjunction and a second simple sentence to each example.

Annual Higher Education Conference

Just before half term break a number of our Year 10 pupils attended the 7th Annual Higher Education Conference at Hope University. All secondary schools on the Wirral were represented at the Conference and were welcomed with a Key Note address from Professor Bill Chambers, the Vice Chancellor of the University.

Pupils spent the day experiencing the various workshops they had chosen to participate in, among which was a presentation by the Police, explaining routes through university into the Police Graduate programme. Other sessions included Vocational Pathways to a Degree and various subject areas offering degree courses such as Creative Computing, Drama and Maths.

Other workshops offered insights into student life and preparation for university through subject choice, student finance and voluntary work.

Feedback from our own pupils was extremely positive and they felt their day to have been well spent in offering motivation for pursuing Higher Education.
