




Scientists Want their Face on Key rings

Trip to Liverpool University

On Saturday 20th March a group of SJP students attended the University of Liverpool for a Chemistry competition. As we walked into the laboratories we were overwhelmed with the equipment and laboratory facilities.

Our first task was to carry out standard titrations and using calculations we worked out the concentration of a solution.

We had the opportunity to work on an infrared machine and plot a graph of how much infrared light a tablet absorbed.

We also had to work out the percentage of deoxybenzone on two different tablets. To our surprise, it was only 23%, the rest being iust powder. There was а lecture on mass spectrometry which was studied very interesting as we this technique in unit 1 of our course, we learned how it was used in everyday life.

Overall this was a fantastic opportunity which benefited our practical skills and challenged our academic studies.

Netball News



That Sunday evening the disciples were meeting behind locked doors because they were afraid of the Jewish leaders. Suddenly, Jesus was standing there among them! "Peace be with you," he said. As he spoke, he showed them the wounds in his hands and his side. They were filled with joy when they saw the Lord! Again he said, "Peace be with you.

As the Father has sent me, so I am sending you." Then he breathed on them and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive anyone's sins, they are forgiven. If you do not forgive them, they are not forgiven."

One of the twelve disciples, Thomas (nicknamed the Twin), was not with the others when Jesus came. They told him, "We have seen the Lord!"

But he replied, "I won't believe it unless I see the nail wounds in his hands, put my fingers into them, and place my hand into the wound in his side."

Eight days later the disciples were together again, and this time Thomas was with them. The doors were locked; but suddenly, as before, Jesus was standing among them. "Peace be with you," he said.
