



SJP in Election frenzy!

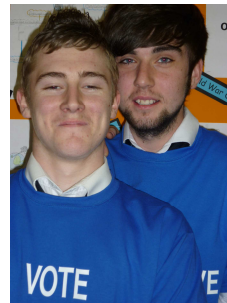

SJP's Champions League

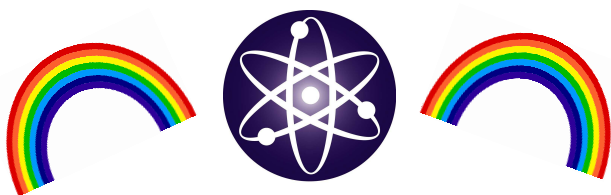

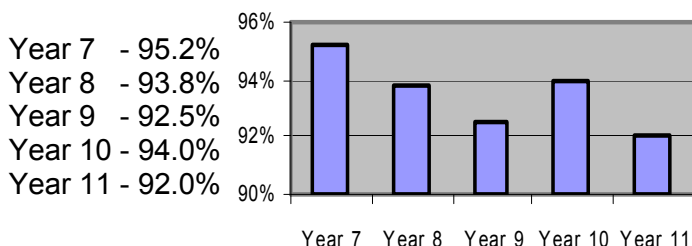
Trips
