


mend this day out to anyone. It was a fun and educational day out.

Archaeology



This week our budding archaeologists got to handle real archaeological finds that were nearly 1000 years old!

This was the second session in a series of archaeological 'tasters' running on Tuesday evenings 3:30 – 4:30. Pupils were shown how archaeologists draw and record pottery which is one of the most common finds on any excavation.

Pottery can give archaeologists lots of information about the past, especially when trying to date a site. Archaeologists can even test ancient pottery to find out what it used to contain!

Weekly Theme—Concern

One of the Pharisees asked him over for a meal. He went to the Pharisee's house and sat down at the dinner table. Just then a woman of the village, the town harlot, having learned that Jesus was a quest in the home of the Pharisee, came with a bottle of very expensive perfume and stood at his feet, weeping, raining tears on his feet. Letting down her hair, she dried his feet, kissed them, and anointed them with the perfume. When the Pharisee who had invited him saw this, he said to himself, "If this man was the prophet I thought he was, he would have known what kind of woman this is who is falling all over him."
