Solution for last week

12. The Monty Hall problem

You could switch (assuming you would prefer a car to a goat). It is tempting to assume that the two remaining doors have an equal chance of hiding the star prize, but this neglects the fact that the host's choice of door to open is not independent of your initial choice.

The probability of your initial choice being correct is $\frac{1}{2}$. This probability doesn't change when the host opens one of the other doors, so the probability that the remaining door hides the prize is $\frac{2}{3}$.
