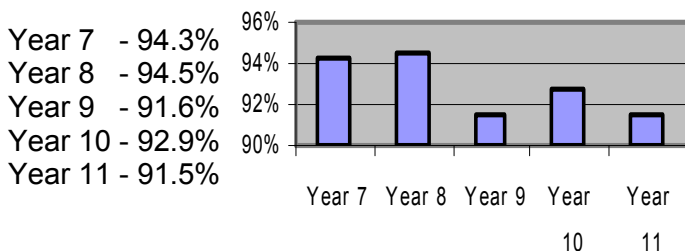



Weekly Theme - 'Running on Empty'



Many people are so involved in their own daily work, shopping, earning and spending money, that they sometimes do not seem aware of their own spiritual life and its needs. often we find that this still does not take the "emptiness" away. We forget that the empty space inside can only be really filled by knowing and loving God. We can be blind to our real needs and be spiritually "running on empty" and in need of the life-giving fuel that only Jesus can offer to us.

John 9

As he went along, he saw a man blind from birth. His disciples asked him, "Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?"

After saying this, he spit on the ground, made some mud with the saliva, and put it on the man's eyes. "Go," he told him, "wash in the Pool of Siloam" (this word means "Sent"). So the man went and washed, and came home seeing.

His neighbours and those who had formerly seen him begging asked, "Isn't this the same man who used to sit and beg?" Some claimed that he was.

Others said, "No, he only looks like him." But he himself insisted, "I am the man."

They brought to the Pharisees the man who had been blind. Now

the day on which Jesus had made the mud and opened the man's eyes was a Sabbath. Therefore the Pharisees also asked him how he had received his sight. "He put mud on my eyes," the man replied, "and I washed, and now I see." Some of the Pharisees said, "This man is not from God, for he does not keep the Sabbath."

But others asked, "How can a sinner perform such signs?" So they were divided.

Then they turned again to the blind man, "What have you to say about him? It was your eyes he opened."

The man replied, "He is a prophet."

To this they replied, "You were steeped in sin at birth; how dare you lecture us!" And they threw him out.

Jesus heard that they had thrown him out, and when he found him, he said, "Do you believe in the Son of Man?"

Who is he, sir?" the man asked. "Tell me so that I may believe in him."

Jesus said, "You have now seen him; in fact, he is the one speaking with you."

Then the man said, "Lord, I believe," and he worshiped him.

God our Father and Mother, you cared for us so much that you gave us your Son, as the light of the world.

May we not be blind, but see the way that leads to a peaceful conscience and a good life. May you be the "fuel" of our spiritual life.
