




Attendance

French Borrowed Words

Did you know that there are hundreds of words and expressions that we use in English that are actually French? Here are some of the most common examples that we use without even realising:

5 pirates of different ages have a treasure trove of 100 gold coins.


On their ship, they decide to split the coins using this scheme: the oldest

pirate proposes how to share the coins, and ALL pirates (including the oldest) vote for or against it.



Weekly Theme - 'Gentleness'



Today, the word "gentle" is more often associated with products for sale than people. "Gentle on your skin" means being soft; but the word really means "kind", "courteous" or "caring". Jesus describes himself as gentle: "Learn from me, for I am gentle...." We live in a sometimes hard and cynical world, a violent age and we need to be gentle people, we need to show other people that we are followers of Jesus by the way we live. We need to show others that there is a better way to live.

Matthew 11:25-30

At that time Jesus said, "I praise you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, because you have hidden these things from the wise and learned, and revealed them to little children. Yes, Father, for this is what you were pleased to do.

"All things have been committed to me by my Father. No one knows the Son except the Father, and no one knows the Father except the Son and those to whom the Son chooses to reveal him.

"Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light."

Father, through the gentle obedience of your Son you saved a hard and fallen world. May that gentleness inspire us to learn from Jesus, to be more gentle and caring in our daily lives. Amen
