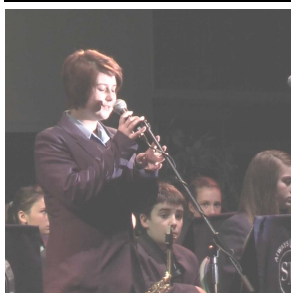




Music Festival



On Thursday around 200 pupils were involved in two performances of the Music Festival 2010 – a celebration of the musical life of SJP. The Festival began with the SJP Brass Band, who skilfully recreated the music of

Next to perform were the Key Stage Three Choir singing two well-known songs, "Use Somebody" and "Where is the Love". JB RAISES £308 FOR CAFOD!



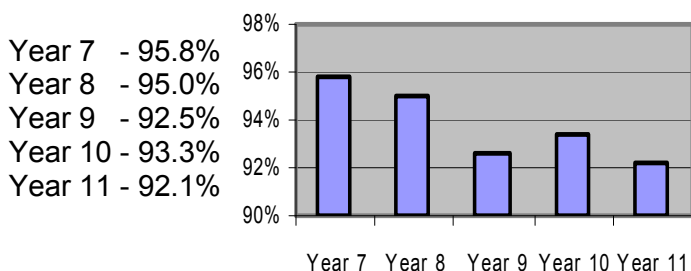

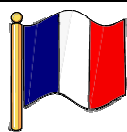

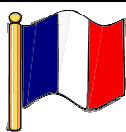

Weekly Theme— Talking to God is easy



Luke 18: 1-8 Then Jesus told his disciples a parable to show them that they should always pray and not give up. He said: "In a certain town there was a judge who neither feared God nor cared about men. And there

was a widow in that town who kept coming to him with the plea, 'Grant me justice against my adversary.'

"For some time he refused. But finally he said to himself, 'Even though I don't fear God or care about men, yet because this widow keeps bothering me, I will see that she gets justice, so that she won't eventually wear me out with her coming!' "

And the Lord said, "Listen to what the unjust judge says. And will not God bring about justice for his chosen ones, who cry out to him day and night? Will he keep putting them off? I tell you, he will see that they get justice, and quickly. However, when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on the earth?"

Reflection As a Christian we should think of prayer as being like oxygen, there can be no life without it. When you fall in love with somebody, you want to be with them all the time, you talk to them and share your hopes and ideas with them. If we believe in God and if we think of Jesus as our friend, then it's natural for us to want to talk to him. It's not always easy to pray but we should always remember that God is there always ready to listen to us. Some of our best prayers and conversations are often made when we feel anxious about something and think of

ourselves as being far away from God.

Why not make a little time this week to get to know God better?

Why not start with this prayer:

Lord our God, Father of all, keep me safe.

You know what I am thinking; inspire me to speak to you in prayer, so that our relationship with you will grow and develop.
