I am blossoming and I have a lot of flowers wrapped around my trunk and name tags hanging from my branches.


Years pass and I'm still here, planted for soldiers.


Now Thomas, one of the Twelve, was not with the disciples when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord!"

But he said to them, "Unless I see the nail marks in his hands and put my finger where the nails were, and put my hand into his side, I will not believe."


