
Year 7 & 8 Film Night

Weekly Theme - 'Water and Simplicity'



We are all aware of how important education is, but imagine if the reasons for not being able to come to school were as simple as a lack of water. How could we attend school if there wasn't a toilet we could use? Or even something as simple as being able to concentrate because we are too dehydrated from a lack of water.

But this is the reality for students in sub-Saharan Africa, who have to walk miles in search of water before they have even begun their lessons. When they arrive in school they might be late for lessons, dehydrated, tired and as the temperature increases their concentration also drops. All this before we have even thought about being able to use the toilet.

When we think of how the simplest things are often the ones that can cause most chaos and disruption. If others are without them, it makes us evaluate how lucky we are.

How often do we take the simple act of turning on a tap

for granted? During Lent, as a college community, we are encouraging our students to think of the importance of water in every day life and how we often take this simple gift for granted. As a result of students being without water, sanitation and the diseases it leads to; 443 million school days are lost every year.

To show how much we appreciate our gift of water we can:

- Take a 3-4 minute shower instead of a bath as a 5 minute shower uses more water than a person in a slum uses in a whole week.
- Turn off the tap whilst you are brushing your teeth.
- Do washing up in large batches, rather than using a little water each time.
