

Solution for last week

14. Number Lines 2

This is a little easier that the previous puzzle. Put 6 in the centre. Then place 1 opposite 11, 2 opposite 10, etc, to give totals of 18. In both puzzles the realisation that you should put the median number in the centre to maintain symmetry helps enormously. (you should also put 1 or 11 in the centre, since the remaining numbers can be paired off in these cases to give totals of 14 and 22.

Weekly Theme - 'Stay Awake'


