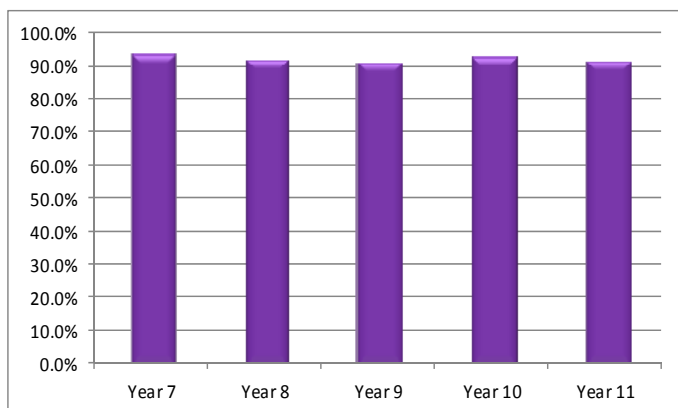

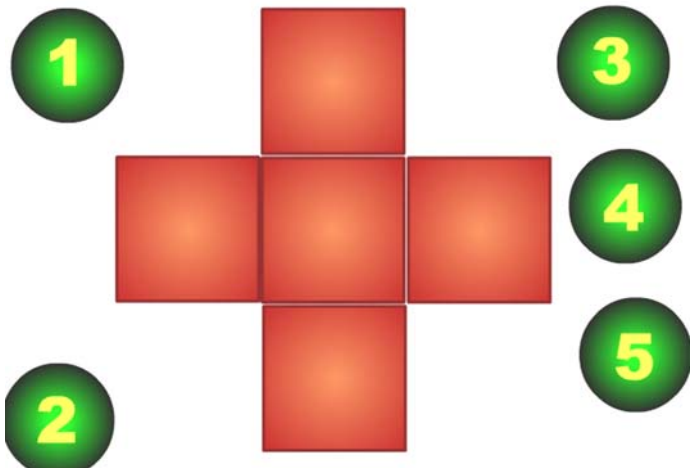

Weekly Theme - 'Equality'

Luke 7: 1-10

When Jesus had finished saying all this to the people who were listening, He entered Capernaum. There, a centurion's servant, whom his master valued highly, was ill and about to die. The centurion heard of Jesus and sent some elders of the Jews to Him, asking Him to come and heal his servant. When they came to Jesus, they pleaded earnestly with Him, 'This man deserves to have you do this, because he loves our nation and has built our synagogue.' So Jesus went with them.

He was not far from the house when the centurion sent friends to say to Him: 'Lord, don't trouble yourself, for I do not deserve to have you come under my roof. That is why I did not even consider myself worthy to come to you. But say the word, and my servant will be healed. For I myself am a man under authority, with soldiers under me. I tell this one, "Go", and he goes; and that one, "Come", and he comes. I say to my servant, "Do this", and he does it.'

When Jesus heard this, He was amazed at him, and turning to the crowd following Him, He said, 'I tell you, I have not found such great faith even in Israel.' Then the men who had been sent returned to the house and found the servant well.

It is sometimes really difficult for us to treat everybody

exactly the same. it's natural for us to like people who like the same things that we do. But we cannot pick and choose the people that we want to get on with.

Take for example a nurse working on a hospital ward. He or she may have their preferences about their patients, but they cannot pick and choose who they look after, they must treat each of their patients equally and give them the same care and attention.

God goes one step further, He actually loves every person equally and He loves everyone the same.

These days when we hear so much being said that is critical of people Muslims, or Sikhs or Christians, because of what they believe or of some of their actions, we have to remember that God's love for each of us is the same, we who are Christians don't get more of His love and care. Colour, class, gender or belief mean nothing to God, He simply loves each one of us equally.

Father your love never fails.

You offer it to each person that you have created.

Social class, colour or gender mean nothing to you, may they mean nothing to us, as we offer your love and care to all.
