Alison McGovern Visit



On Friday Alison McGovern MP, came into College to discuss the 'Send My Friend to School Campaign' with our Year 11 and Year 8 pupils.

During summer term Year 7 worked on a campaign to send all children to school by 2015. There are 67 million children worldwide who do not have access to any education and the campaign seeks to ask the government to help this change.

Year 7 and some Year 11 pupils wrote letters to Alison McGovern asking her to support this campaign. As a result she came into school to meet

with the pupils involved and discuss why education is so important. SJP pupils spoke with passion about why they believed we should back this campaign and asked hard hitting questions about what the government can do to help. Alison McGovern was very impressed with our support for the campaign and asked us to continue with this support. She also offered us the opportunity to help with other projects and said that we would be welcome to visit her in the houses of parliament.

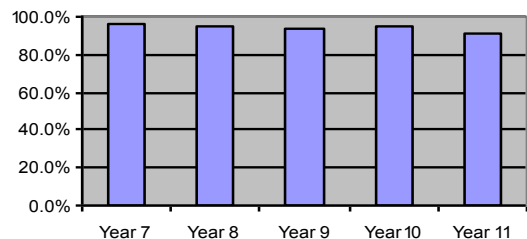



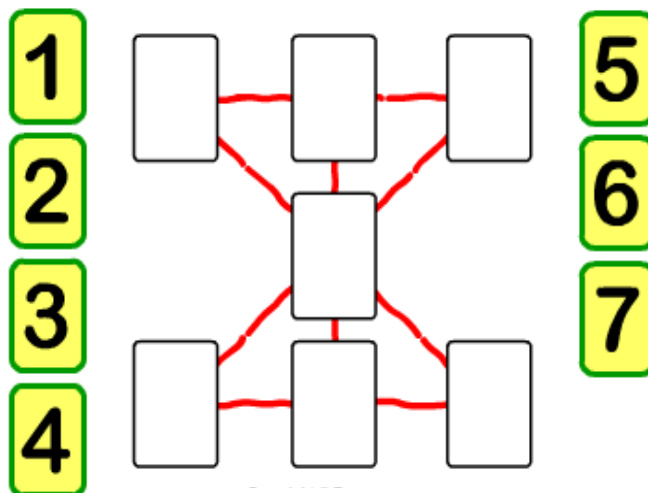

Weekly Theme - 'Saying no to Violence'



James 3:16-4:3

Do you want to be counted wise, to build a reputation for wisdom? Here's what you do: Live well, live wisely, live humbly. It's the way you live, not the way you talk, that counts. Mean-spirited ambition isn't wisdom. Boasting that you are wise isn't wisdom. Twisting the truth to

make yourselves sound wise isn't wisdom. It's the furthest thing from wisdom—it's animal cunning, devilish conniving. Whenever you're trying to look better than others or get the better of others, things fall apart and everyone ends up at the other's throats.

Real wisdom, God's wisdom, begins with a holy life and is characterised by getting along with others. It is gentle and reasonable, overflowing with mercy and blessings, not hot one day and cold the next, not two-faced. You can develop a healthy, robust community that lives right with God and enjoy its results only if you do the hard work of getting along with each other, treating each other with dignity and honour.

Where do you think all these appalling wars and quarrels come from? Do you think they just happen? Think again. They come about because you want your own way, and fight for it deep inside yourselves. You lust for what you don't have and are willing to kill to get it. You want what isn't yours and will risk violence to get your hands on it.

You wouldn't think of just asking God for it, would you? And why not? Because you know you'd be asking for what you have no right to. You're spoiled children, each wanting your own way.

Violence breeds violence, Jesus would never tolerate it. He stopped his disciples arguing. He stopped Peter using his sword and he died a victim of extreme violence. In a Christian community like ours there should be no place for any form of violence; and that includes people with attitudes and violent language and bullying. Major world conflict can grow from people falling out with each other.

Father, guide us as you guide creation according to your law of love.

Fill us with your own generous love that we may find his love in each other and never resort to violent language or actions.
