


Food Revolution



Weekly Theme - 'Forgiveness'

Luke 7: 36-50

When one of the Pharisees invited Jesus to have dinner with him, He went to the Pharisee's house and reclined at the table. A woman in that town who lived a sinful life learned that Jesus was eating at the Pharisee's house, so she came there with an alabaster jar of perfume. As she stood behind Him at His feet weeping, she began to wet His feet with her tears. Then she wiped them with her hair, kissed them and poured perfume on them. But whoever has been forgiven little loves little." Then Jesus said to her, "Your sins are forgiven." The other guests began to say among themselves, "Who is this who even forgives sins?" Jesus said to the woman, "Your faith has saved you; go in peace."

The three hardest words that we ever have to say are 'I am sorry'. Often people think that the church is made up of people that are good all the time. In fact the church is for people who have to say those words, and do say them to God and to those they have offended. Thank God that the church is there for sinners! Jesus during his life on earth was told off many times by respectable people for spending time with the gamblers, drug addicts and prostitutes of his time.
