Pupils left the auditorium singing the praises of the LIPA performers whilst discussing their own interpretations of the play.






Exams - Year 7, 8, 9 & 10

Drama Club - A Year 7 Review



Weekly Theme - Father, Son and Spirit



Matthew 28:16-20

Then the eleven disciples left for Galilee, going to the mountain where Jesus had said they would find him. There they met him and worshiped him - but some of them weren't sure it really was Jesus!

He told his disciples, "I have been given all authority in heaven and earth. Therefore go and make disciples in all the nations, baptising them into the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and then teach these new disciples to obey all the commands I have given you; and be sure of this - that I am with you always, even to the end of the world."

This week's message was a shock to Jesus' first followers. Go to ALL nations? But they were Jews!

But this was Matthew's message for the early Christians. The Gospel was originally written for a community of mostly Jewish followers of Jesus. Go beyond your comfort zone, it tells them. Build relationships with people who are different, with people you never expected to enter your life.

Does this message shock us still today? Look around at your life. Is everyone the same? Same skin colour? Same interests? Same level of income? Same school activities? It's easy to stay in our comfort zone; but if we do we miss out.

The message is clear. We find life fuller when we meet, serve, learn from, and develop relationships will all types of people.

Jesus asks us this week to step out of our comfort zones and stretch ourselves.

Be bold, and be strong!
