

English Key Stage 3 Takeaway Homework

Key Stage 3 pupils have really enjoyed completing their English homework this half term! The English Department introduced our new 'Takeaway Menu' which allowed pupils to choose tasks to complete each week. Menu options ranged from 'Literacy Starters' to 'Main Courses' and 'Reflective Desserts'. All tasks were designed to complement the novels and plays studied by Key Stage 3 pupils in their English lessons.

Two menu choices which proved to be extremely popular were the 'Easy Bake English Cake' option, which asked pupils to bake cakes inspired by the novel or play they were studying in class and the 'Creative Cracker' choice, which involved creating and designing 3D models based on class texts.

The novel, 'Billionaire Boy', by David Walliams inspired some creative Year 7 pupils to bake cakes decorated with huge, gold, chocolate coins reflecting the incredible wealth of the main character, Joe Spud. Michael Morpurgo's,

> 'Kensuke's Kingdom', which tells the story of a young boy shipwrecked on a desert island in-

spired other imaginative Year 7 pupils to create desert island cakes, filled with exotic ingredients while inventive Year 7 pupils created 3D models of islands, boats and even characters from the novel.



cakes as well as 3D models of Macbeth, Lady Macbeth and Scottish castles!




















Literacy Corner



Weekly Theme - Happiness

Matthew 5:1-12

When Jesus saw the crowds, he went up the mountain; and after he sat down, his disciples came to him. Then he began to speak, and taught them, saying:

"Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

"Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be com-

"Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth."

"Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.

"Blessed are the merciful, for they will receive mercy.

"Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God.

"Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God.

"Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

"Blessed are you when people revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you." Every year the Church recalls the example, witness, and prayer of the holy women and men who have been identified by the Church as Saints. These saints are more than just role models; they are family members with whom we continue to share relation, in a bond of prayer, called the Communion of Saints. Every year when we celebrate this day, the Gospel we proclaim recalls for us

Jesus' teaching about happiness, the Beatitudes. We quickly see in this reading that none of those Jesus names as "blessed" or "happy" are expected.

. . the poor in spirit, the meek, the persecuted. Jesus' blueprint for happiness reflects little

of what the world might call happiness.

During November we remember all those who have died. We remember in particular the members of our own families who we have loved, who are now Saints in Heaven. We pray for them knowing that they are praying to God for us.

Eternal rest grant unto them O Lord and let perpetual light shine upon them. May they rest in peace.
