



Defibrillator in College

We have a defibrillator in College which is positioned at Reception. This has been funded by the Oliver King Foundation, with our thanks.

Their foundation has been set up in the name of Oliver King, a 12 year old who sadly passed away because of SADS (Sudden Arrhythmic Death Syndrome) which describes heart conditions that can cause sudden death in young people.

Their aim is to try and raise awareness about SADS which commonly affects people aged between 12 and 35 years of age.



At SJP, we now have 12 members of staff trained to use the equipment. The defibrillator can be easily removed from the wall and taken to where it is required, if it is ever needed.

Weekly Theme - We Are What We Do!

Matthew 21:33-43

'Listen to another parable. There was a landowner who planted a vineyard, put a fence around it, dug a wine press in it, and built a watch-tower. Then he leased it to tenants and went to another country.

When the harvest time had come, he sent his slaves to the tenants to collect his produce. But the tenants seized his slaves and beat one, killed another, and stoned another.

Again he sent other slaves, more than the first; and they treated them in the same way. Finally he sent his son to them, saying, "They will respect my son." But when the tenants saw the son, they said to themselves, "This is the heir; come, let us kill him and get his inheritance." So they seized him, threw him out of the vineyard, and killed him.

Now when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?' They said to him, 'He will put those wretches to a miserable death, and lease the vineyard to other tenants who will give him the produce at the harvest time.' Jesus said to them, 'Have you never read in the scriptures:

> "The stone that the builders rejected Has become the cornerstone; this was the Lord's doing, and it is amazing in our eyes"?

Therefore I tell you, the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people that produces the fruits of the kingdom.



God worries about us. God tries to warn us when we are heading down a path that can hurt us or others. This week's gospel is all about the warnings that God has sent throughout the ages. Many of God's warnings came through prophets who challenged Israel to end poverty and injustice. Often the religious leaders ignored the prophet's warnings and even had the prophets killed.

God warns people today in a variety of ways, through concerned friends, through parents who offer us love and stability, through adults who counsel or challenge us.

But are our ears open to what they have to say?
