

# Holocaust Memorial Day 2016 Flame for Heroes Competition





#### Antoni Gaudi and La Sagrada Familia

Antoni Gaudi is perhaps one of Spain's most famous architects, his designs and sense of style is unique and is known for his distinctive and colourful works of art.

The building that Antoni Gaudi is best known for is La Sagrada Familia in Barcelona. La Sagrada Familia means 'Holy Family'. He began this huge church in 1882, it still has not been finished, and won't be for at least another ten years! Gaudi designed and redesigned this building, he was forever tinkering with the plans. Unfortunately, the last blueprint he drew was destroyed in 1938 so the architects who are currently working on the building don't know exactly what Gaudi had in mind for the church. The finished building will be able to accommodate up to 13,000 people. It will measure 312 feet long and almost 200 feet wide. When finished, the Sagrada Familia will have 18 towers, each of which represents a person. 12 of the towers will represent the apostles, and 4 of them will represent the evangelists.

# Weekly Theme - "The circle of life"

Luke 4:21-30

"He came to Nazareth where he had grown up. As he always did on the Sabbath, he went to the meeting place. When he stood up to read, he was handed the scroll of the prophet Isaiah. Unrolling the scroll, he found the place where it was written, Gods Spirit is on me; he's chosen me to preach the Message of good news to the poor, Sent me to announce pardon to prisoners and recovery of sight to the blind, To set the burdened and battered free, to announce, "This is Gods year to act!"He rolled up the scroll, handed it back to the assistant, and sat down. Every eye in the place was on him, intent. Then he said, "You've just heard Scripture make history. It came true just now in this place."All who were there, watching and listening, were surprised at how well he spoke. But they also said, "Isn't this Joseph's son, the one we've known since he was a child?'

He answered, "I suppose you're going to quote the proverb, 'Doctor, go heal yourself. Do here in your hometown what we heard

you did in Capernaum.' Well, let me tell you something: No prophet is ever welcomed in his hometown. Isn't it a fact that there were many widows in Israel at the time of Elijah during that three and a half years of drought when famine devastated the land, but the only widow to whom Elijah was sent was in Sarepta in Sidon? And there were many lepers in Israel at the time of the prophet Elisha but the only one cleansed was Naaman the Syrian." That made everyone in the meeting place seething with anger. They threw him out, banishing him from the village, then took him to a mountain cliff at the edge of the village to throw him to his doom, but he gave them the slip and was on his way."

The Greeks and the Romans believed in lots of gods who they thought would help them out in different situations.
