Basil Hume Sixth Form Centre

The new Basil Hume Sixth Form Centre provides hi-spec study facilities for our students. There is a large 'open plan' study area with over 70 workstations and wi-fi access as well as offices for the Sixth Form Pastoral team. The new build connects with our College Library which our students can access with additional computer facilities available.

The Ann Benson-Burke Study Centre provides the students with an area for independent work and study. There are a number of bespoke Sixth Form classrooms including a new Media Suite with an

additional area for film and media development, where students study in a truly immersive environment. Photography, SFX and VFX are also a focus for the students as they utilise the Green Screen Studio with its wall to wall, ChromaKey Cyclorama enabling the students to create work of a professional standard.

The exciting new development means that our Sixth Formers will have facilities second to none. We look forward to welcoming Bishop Mark Davies on Wednesday 23rd September to open and bless the new centre.

We are finishing at 2.20pm on Tuesday 22nd September. Buses will not be available at that time.

Puffin Crossing

As a result of a partnership between SJP School council, Living Streets and Road Safety Department we now have a Puffin Crossing. The crossing is situated outside the front of SJP and enables our pupils to cross Old Chester Road safely from College to the bus stops.

What is a Puffin Crossing?

Pelicans and Puffins are essentially the same, except that a Puffin Crossing has its sequences controlled by sensors mounted on the lights, rather than a timer. These sensors can detect whether any pedestrians are on the crossing and control the colour of the lights accordingly. Once the control button has been pressed, the lights will only change back to green once the crossing is clear. A Puffin Crossing doesn't have a flashing amber phase; you have to wait until the lights turn green before you move off.

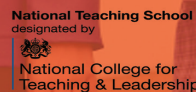

Antarctica A Really Cool Place

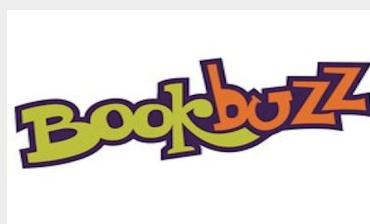
On Tuesday 15th September the Geography Department invited a guest speaker, Mr Brian Anderson into SJP. Brian is a local photographer and explorer. He has travelled to over 55 nations and territories in Europe, Africa, Asia, South America, and further afield to the High Arctic, Geographic North Pole and Antarctica, to capture landscape, wildlife and travel images. Brian Anderson believes photography is a 'powerful medium of expression and communication' and he uses his images so children and adults can explore, experience and discover the amazing places he has been to. Year 9 are currently studying a topic on Antarctica and Climate Change. Brian was able to show amazing photographs of the

continent as part of his talk 'Antarctica A Really Cool Place'. He visited Antarctica in 2003 and 2007 on the Professor Molchanov and Akademik Shokalskiy, and 2009 and 2010 on the Russian icebreaker 'Kapitan Khlebnikov' which sailed through the Weddell Sea ice pack to James Ross Island, where he was greeted by Emperor penguins and Crabeater seals. He has also explored the Antarctic Peninsula, Snow Hill Emperor Colony and the Falkland Islands. Our Pupils were able to get a real impression of the wildlife, climate and landforms that Antarctica has to offer, enabling Year 9 to adopt a greater understanding of the remote and wild continent.

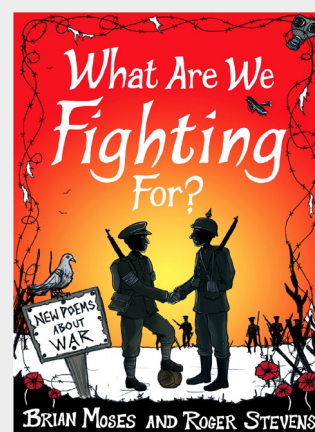
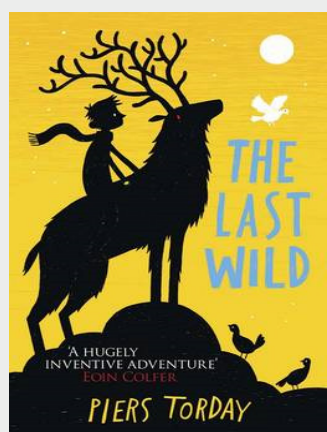
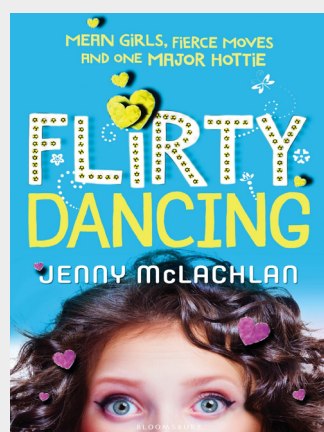


FREE BOOKS FOR ALL YEAR 7 PUPILS

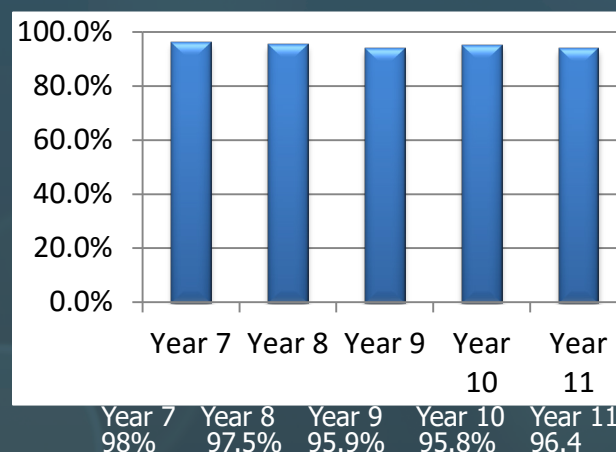

Weekly Theme "Saying no to violence"

James 3:16-4:3

Do you want to be counted wise, to build a reputation for wisdom? Here's what you do: Live well, live wisely, live humbly. It's the way you live, not the way you talk, that counts. Mean-spirited ambition isn't wisdom. Boasting that you are wise isn't wisdom. Twisting the truth to make yourselves sound wise isn't wisdom. It's the furthest thing from wisdom—it's animal cunning, devilish conniving. Whenever you're trying to look better than others or get the better of others, things fall apart and everyone ends up at the others' throats.

Real wisdom, God's wisdom, begins with a holy life and is characterised by getting along with others. It is gentle and reasonable, overflowing with mercy and blessings, not hot one day and cold the next, not two-faced. You can develop a healthy, robust community that lives right with God and enjoy its results only if you do the hard work of getting along with each other, treating each other with dignity and honour.

Where do you think all these appalling wars and quarrels come from? Do you think they just happen? Think again. They come about because you want your own way, and fight for it deep inside yourselves. You lust for what you don't have and are willing to kill to get it. You want what isn't yours and will risk violence to get your hands on it. You wouldn't think of just asking God for it, would you? And why not? Because you know you'd be asking for what you have no right to. You're spoiled children, each wanting your own way.
