

# **Epstein Theatre**

# Trip

On the afternoons of Wednesday the 18th and Thursday the 19th of April, the year 8 and year 7 pupils of St John Plessington Catholic College were promised a momentous occasion. They braced themselves for the full, and unimaginable immersion into a world of words as old as time itself. William Shakespeare. The very name, and two of his most culturally popular plays - Romeo and Juliet, and A Midsummer Night's Dream - promised two spectacular trips. Set within the thriving heart of Liverpool, the Epstein theatre did not disappoint. From the moment of departure, both year groups alike were buzzing with energy and enthusiasm, the mood of anticipation brightened by the cheerful sunny day. Upon arrival, the pupils absorbed with astonished alacrity the archaic and faded appearance of the theatre, spilling into the rows and their seats with turning heads and some eyes that had never before seen a theatre. And what a show it was.

Both performances were filled with a vital, powerful energy. Students laughed in delight as Shakespeare's bawdy lines were uttered in the friendly and approachable Liverpool dialect, the accent itself proving an eclectic manner






of expression as Romeo traversed 'Liverpool' in search of his Juliet. Heads turned and eyes searched, as actors rushed between rows to invade the stage, used the upper stalls to re-enact the famous balcony scene between Verona's beloved romantics, and climbed upon the sides of the walls to convey an earnest energy that injected the theatre with life. The pupils' engagement with both plays was evident in their constantly turning heads, and utter silence, held rapt withal. A drunken Benvolio stumblingly scoured the audience for his 'Romo', grabbing stifled laughter from pupils as they shifted at his approach, the stage itself by no means the limit of these plays. All actors constantly traversed the theatre and never allowed the audience to drift from their focus.

Perhaps most engaging was the sheer merriment of Daniel Taylor's A Midsummer Night's Dream, a dizzying, dazzling display of pacey, beating music and actors filled with earnest electricity. Year 7 were utterly enthralled, drawn in by the dramatic impact of music mingled with Oberon's slow and decisive prowl about the stage, and laughing aloud at the sheer madness that was Puck. Both theatre outings were a huge success with pupils, delighting them with both friendly, approachable versions of Shakespeare's plays, and also a genuine experience of theatre that will impress upon them great value for their studies ahead.

#### HAVE YOU EVER CONSIDERED A CAREER IN TEACHING?

School Direct is a one-year, full time teacher training programme. At SJP, all School Direct Associate Teachers (ATs) are allocated a dedicated subject mentor, and guided by specialist tutors. At the end of the year, successful ATs will qualify with QTS and PGCE, which is accredited by the University of Chester.

#### What are the entry requirements?

- UK university degree 2:1 or above (2:2 for Maths, Physics, Chemistry, MFL) or a recognised equivalent qualification - we also accept applications from final year students due to graduate in 2018
- Grade C or above in GCSE **English and Mathematics** (Science for Primary)
- At least two full days of school observation

You will be required to undergo an enhanced DBS check to verify your suitability to work with young people

#### What subjects do we offer?

We currently offer teacher training for Biology, Business Studies, Chemistry, Computer Science, DT, Drama, English, Geography, History, Maths, Media, Modern Foreign Languages, PE, Physics, Primary, RE and Social Sciences.

In addition, our School Experience Programme offers the opportunity to spend a day or two at SJP in your subject department. You will be able to observe classes taking place, engage with pupils, and speak to subject staff and the School Direct ATs who are currently
