



I Shall Not Hate: A Gaza Doctor's Journey on the Road to Peace and Human Dignity.

This week's book has been recommended by our Director of PE, Mr Nunnery. He explains why he found this book so inspirational. Have you read this? Let us know.

A Harvard-trained Palestinian doctor who was born and raised in the Jabalia refugee camp in the Gaza Strip and "who has devoted his life to medicine and reconciliation between Israelis and Palestinians"

A book that moved me to core; how one person can put aside him personal hatred of the environment he lives in but can still help those who have caused his life to be hell.

Year 7 Roman Experience Trip to Chester.

Over Two hundred year 7 pupils visited the Dewa centre in Chester to further their understanding of the Roman history of Chester.

During LP1 pupils in year 7 have been learning about the growth of the Roman Empire, part of their studies was about the Roman invasion of England. To bring the topic of the Romans to an end the history department took pupils to Chester to examine Roman artefacts, visit the amphitheatre and tour the city, following in the footsteps of a Roman Soldier. After a walking tour pupils visited the Dewa Centre and learnt about life in a Roman Fortification. Pupils travelled back in time and experienced daily life in 70AD. The tour of the Dewa Centre finished underground. Pupils were allowed to see first hand the archaeological dig that is taking place under the city and view some of the items that have been discovered over time. The day finished with pupils being allowed to handle some artefacts, examine and even wear the uniform that would have been worn by a Roman soldier. All students had a fabulous day and gained some fabulous insights into Chester's history.







Living History Experience Day

As this year marks one hundred years since the end of the war it was a wonderful opportunity for pupils



to learn about the conditions in the trenches and how soldiers would be treated for wounds on the battlefield. The men who visited our college brought many artefacts with them and pupils were given the opportunity to see and take part in reenactments of treatment during the First World War. The presentation brought the history of the war to life as pupils learnt about the first ever gas masks, guns, bombs and even how to evacuate a soldier from the Western Front. Pupils in years 10 and 11 will sit an exam on medicine on the Western Front at the end of year 11 so the presentation was invaluable to their knowledge and understanding of a war that took place over one hundred years ago. The day was a great success and enjoyed by all taking part.


The most beautiful memorial we can give to those we love is a living memory nourished by prayer, gratitude and ever-deepening affection.

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What are the entry requirements?

- UK university degree 2:1 or above (2:2 for Maths, Physics, Chemistry, MFL) or a
- recognised equivalent qualification – we also accept applications from final year students due to graduate in 2018
- Grade C or above in GCSE English and Mathematics (Science for Primary)

At least two full days of school observation.

You will be required to undergo an enhanced DBS check to verify your suitability to work with young people.

TEACHING

School Direct is a one-year, full time teacher training programme. At SJP, all School Direct Associate Teachers (ATs) are allocated a dedicated subject mentor, and guided by specialist tutors. At the end of the year, successful ATs will qualify with QTS and PGCE, which is accredited by the University of Chester.

What subjects do we offer?

We currently offer teacher training for Biology, Business Studies, Chemistry, Computer Science, DT, Drama, English, Geography, History, Maths, Media, Modern Foreign Languages, PE, Physics, Primary, RE and Social Sciences.

In addition, our School Experience Programme offers the opportunity to spend a day or two at SJP in your subject department. You will be able to observe classes taking place, engage with pupils, and speak to subject staff and the School Direct ATs who are currently training with us.
