Thank you to all students and parents for the positive comments we have received regarding the uniform changes. I would like to clarify one or two points. As you know, next year we are introducing a school sweater for boys and girls with logo. The sweater is compulsory after October half term. For the first half term, therefore, it is optional although I am sure that many of our students will be wearing it in September. Girls have the option of wearing navy/black opaque tights OR navy socks. For September the socks may be knee length or midlength. They must not be ankle socks. They must be navy in colour, plain without patterns or logos. The uniform will be available from next week in the Wirral Uniform Centre. The skirts will be available from around 20th August. If you are buying PE kit please ensure that you are buying the new style PE kit outlined in my recent letter to you.
