#### **Arts Showcase 2022**

St John Plessington Catholic College recently held its Winter Arts Showcase 2022, a free event hosted by its drama department that celebrates students' hard work throughout the term.

The event welcomed over 200 performers, parents, carers, staff, family, and friends and consisted of 26 separate acts by students from all year groups.

Performances included a variety of exciting drama pieces, music, dance routines, and other media which were all created in class as well as in extracurricular clubs.

Some of the plays that students performed included 'Romeo and Juliet', 'Blood Brothers' and 'Grease the Musical' whilst musical acts showcased a large variety of styles, demonstrating the vocal and instrumental abilities of students. Many of the performers sang and played their own accompaniment.

'Learn to Fly', an original piece created by Year 12 students for the Holy Family Catholic Multi-Academy Trust creativity conference, was delivered on the night too.

Students were also responsible for the technical support of the showcase with a team of sixth formers taking the lead on this.

The evening provided an opportunity for the school community to come together in appreciation of the arts and talents of the school's students and served to develop their confidence.


#### **Maths Department**

Sense of Statistics

Last half term Year 10 pupils were busy trying to make sense of the statistics which surround us.

Pupils investigated the accuracy of numbers and statistics in the public domain, building on the research work from economist and broadcaster Tim Harford, it was fascinating to read the diversity of topics chosen, from testosterone and sport, to antidepressants and teenagers, the algorithms used by ants, maths and robots, fashion and the environment, China's GDP data, cheating in chess, the water used to produce a pair of jeans, who pays tax, Ed Sheeran and the mathematics of musical coincidences, questioning claims about Covid and children, or the figures circulating in the media about the recent huge natural disaster in Pakistan.

Quoting one student, Leo Harper-Rose, who chose to debunk the Liverpool FC Conspiracy Theory, "Just because something is viral on the internet, doesn't mean that it is trustworthy and scientifically true." Amelia Jones, opted to analyse claims shared recently in social media that women are 32% more likely to die after an operation by a male surgeon. Here, the truth is more complicated and "we need more female surgeons and more research," according to her. Isabelle Hewitt, looked at hospitalisation rates for children with Covid. She concluded that "Only an educated guess can be made about children in hospital with Covid, but it would be, in reality, a lot lower [than 1 in 100]".







## **Create your future**

Year 12 DT students visited Manchester Central Conference Centre to take part in a UCAS show 'Create your Future'.

They spoke to lecturers & students from a variety of design-based courses, ranging from product design, landscape architecture, theatre design to digital animation.

We have also taken part in 'Odd Socks Day' in partnership with the Anti-Bullying Alliance. This was a day for staff and pupils to show what makes us all unique and to show a physical symbol that we are all against bullying.

Chester Zoo Youth Symposium

Our Lead Eco-Ambassadors, Samuel and Tlffany, attended the Youth Symposium at Chester Zoo to showcase what environmental projects have taken place at SJP so far and their plans for the next 12 months. This included a keynote speech from Jasmine Isa Qureshi, a writer, journalist and until recently, researcher for the BBC Natural History Unit and BBC Earth. # Reading recommendations

Prisoners of Geography - Tim Marshall


This half term Year 9 has been learning about geopolitics and how the geography of places can influence how they develop. This has been done using the two different versions of the book Prisoners of Geography. The book explores how factors such as access to water or resources, being landlocked and the climate can either limit or improve opportunities for development. How can the topography of a country influence their decision to go to war or ensure that they are not a target for invasion? It also considers how these factors can affect the decisions that leaders and politicians make and the impact that geography can have on international affairs.

Prisoners of Geography covers Russia, China, The Middle East, Japan, Korea, Western Europe, USA, The Arctic, India, Africa and Latin America and is written by Tim Marshall a foreign affairs journalist with over 30 years experience working for the BBC and Sky News, covering many of the major conflicts during this time.

We would recommend this not only for Year 9 to read but also for GCSE and A Level pupils as it demonstrates the links between geography, history and development in shaping the world around us today.
