ASSESSMENT AND REPORTING 2006/07

Following extensive consultation, I am pleased to report some changes in how we report your child's progress to you.

- 1. We intend to report six times per year, at the following times: November 06, January 07, March 07, May 07, June 07, July 07.
- The reports will be in a revised format, providing you with more information. In particular, we will now report the level or grade your child is currently working at, as well as continuing to provide you with an end of year target and an end of Key Stage target. In addition, we will continue to report an effort grade.
- 3. We also intend to go back to "traditional" parental meetings, where you will have the opportunity to meet your child's subject teachers. We intend to do this according to the format used successfully over the last three years, i.e., by closing the College for the day for those pupils not involved in meetings. To this end, the College will be open for a Consultation Day on 8th November for parents and children in Years 9&10. All other Pupils will be on study leave for this day. This process will be repeated on 24th January for parents and pupils in Years 7&8.
- 4. In addition, we intend to send out to you a new type of report which we are confident will provide you with even more information on your child's progress. Our Learning Coaches are currently busy meeting with all of our pupils to develop what we call an Achievement Portfolio. The Portfolio profiles your child's academic progress to date and is based upon an interview with his or her Learning Coach, leading to an Achievement Plan. It is our intention henceforth to set termly targets for your child based upon his/her progress and to publish these targets to you each term, in addition to the six assessment reports. This will provide you with 9 separate pieces of information regarding your child's progress.
- Along with each Achievement Plan published, there will be an invitation to you to visit the College to discuss your child's progress with us. You may take up this invitation at any time during the academic year.

- 6. Throughout the year we will also be holding a "Take your work home day", when pupils will be invited to take home all of their books and work in a bag provided by the College. You will be invited to sample your child's work and our assessment of it and make comments on how you think we can help your child to meet his or her targets.
- 7. Please also look out for our new Website, which will be launched in early November 2006 at <u>www.stjohnplessington.com</u>. Our Website will contain a wealth of information for parents and pupils and, not least, our interactive Learning Programmes, which as usual will contain web links to resources that will aid your child in wider research.

I hope that the improvements in assessment and communication outlined above will enable your child to fulfil his or her academic potential at the College.

FIRST LEGO LEAGUE ROBOTS SOLVING REAL WORLD PROBLEMS

Each September a new worldwide challenge is announced, relating Robotics to real world issues for 9-16 year olds. This year the theme is Nanotechnology and the ICT department are looking to put together a team of 10 pupils to enter the North West Regional Tournament to be in early December. We will be looking for two pupils from each year group.

The team will work together to build a robot and program it to fulfil the tasks that the challenge demands. It is a timed event and the more tasks the robot completes, the more points are awarded. The team will also need to research an aspect of Nanotechnology and to present their findings in an imaginative way to a panel of judges.

Pupils who feel up to the challenge and who feel they can work well with a team should ask Mr Harvey or Mr Leicester in the ICT Department for more details on how to apply. We are looking to get the team together for this in the first week after the half term break.

THEME FOR THE WEEK

Outward signs of faith have been a hot topic in the news these last few weeks. There have been disputes over the wearing of veils by Muslim women or by wearing a cross as a piece of jewellery by Christians. These disputes can be upsetting to people of faith who feel that these symbols are important.

The wearing of crosses as an item of jewellery by Christians has been a hot topic in the news these last few weeks. Some people who are allowed to wear jewellery in their workplace have been asked to remove a necklace in the shape of a cross. Many have felt very hurt that this outward symbol of their Christian faith has been criticised.

While faith symbols are important, we should not seek to be recognised as Christians by the mere fact of wearing a cross around our necks. Our outward symbol of our faith should be the way we behave, the way we treat people... the way we live out our life of faith. That is much more difficult that wearing a piece of jewellery.
