Resurrection to Ascension Witness

He (John the Baptist) was not the light, but a witness to speak for the light. John 1:8

Witness is a word that is often used to describe a person who has seen something – an event, a crime. When Christians speak of witness they often mean talking about faith – they give witness to God as they know him, as they have experienced him.

In the original Greek, the word for witness is $\mu\alpha\rho\tau\mu\rho\epsilon$ (martyre) which has become our English word martyr. Dying for one's faith is the ultimate form of witness. In our lives as Christians living in the UK we are not in a position where we have to sacrifice our lives for our faith. We might have to sacrifice other things such as our time or we might run the risk of being laughed at for our faith. However, it is a risk worth taking.

Playground Planning Committee Visit of Year 6 Pupils to St John Plessington Catholic College

On 24th April, 18 Pupils who will be starting in Year 7 at SJP in September visited us for the morning. The students from St Werburgh's, St Anne's, St John's and St. Laurence's Junior and Primary Schools were transported to SJP in our minibus.

They were invited to help in the planning of an exciting new venture at SJP – the creation of a new Year 7 outdoor area – for use in play, relaxing and the curriculum. This project will help greatly with 'transition' - settling new students quickly into the school. The school was seeking the ideas and opinions of those children in Year 6, who would shortly be coming to SJP, as well as our current students. Working with them was a group of Year 7 students, form councillors and the school 'Eco Council'.

The work began with an opening talk by Mr Kitchin on the aims of the morning and the health and safety, security and caretaking issues, which the group would need to think about. The idea of 'stakeholders' was introduced and discussed, with examples given. Students were then able to list the many people in school and in the wider community who have an interest or 'stake' in our future plans and who should be consulted.

Our Chaplain Alison Benson led prayers and discussion of how to include ideas from our mission statement. Students felt images about the Christian ethos of the school would be a good idea; perhaps built into a reflection / relaxing area.

Year 9 students Grant Gamble and Hayley Reilly from the school 'Eco Team' gave a presentation. Having researched carefully, they raised many issues the group should consider e.g. sustainable materials, recycling, water conservation and the attraction of wildlife to the area. Their presentation was mature, clear and very interesting.

The students inspected the area for the new playground. Measurements were taken, along with observations of the path of the sun, the levels of the ground and the locality of nearby buildings and houses. The fresh air triggered appetites and much wholemeal toast, milk and fresh fruit were eaten. The groups then shared, discussed and presented their ideas, with much good advice from Miss Sutton. After the plenary, each group of students were given their 'homework', to make a detailed plan of the playground, thinking about all 'stakeholders' including local residents. We will invite the Year 6 students back in May to present their completed plans to staff, students, governors, architectural advisers and other stakeholders.

Many thanks to everyone involved with this very successful morning. Much was achieved and new friendships were made.
