A2 Psychology Trip to Chester Zoo

Twenty Sixth Form Psychology Students, who are currently studying Animal Behaviour as part of their A2 course, went with Mr. Wilmshurst on an enrichment visit to Chester Zoo last week. They spent much of the day observing the behaviours of a variety of animals and were treated to an extremely interesting and informative hour-long lecture on animal behaviour by one of the zoo's education team.

Of particular interest to the students were the chimpanzees whose apparently bizarre behaviour can often be attributed to the influence of a single dominant male in the group.





Did you know that the Chimpanzee is one of the only animals that can recognise itself in a mirror? Did you know that a Mandrill yawns to threaten other males?

Did you know that a Peacock's tail serves no other purpose than to attract a female? Did you know that bees perform a dance to inform the other bees where the best flowers for food are? Students have been learning that there are evolutionary and biological explanations for behaviours such as these and that understanding the behaviours of non-human animals can perhaps help us to understand our own. After all, humans *are* animals!
